
NOUN

A noun is a word for a person, place, or thing.

Examples



Proper nouns are the <u>names</u> of people or places like:

Gbarnga


Ellen Johnson Sirleaf

They should be capitalized.

VERB

A verb is a word that describes an action.

Examples



<u>Auxiliary, linking, or helping verbs</u> work with regular verbs to complete a thought:


I am speaking and he is listening.

They have studied all of their notes.

ADJECTIVE

An adjective is a word that gives information about a noun.

Examples



<u>Comparative and superlative suffixes</u> added to adjectives are used to show differences between two or more nouns:

small smaller smallest

ADVERB

An adverb is a word that gives information about a verb, adjective, or other adverb.

<u>Examples</u>



<u>Very</u> is a very popular adverb that can be used to modify both adjectives and adverbs:

He is very slow. He walks very slowly.

PRONOUN

A pronoun is a word that is used in place of or as a substitute for a noun.


Instead of saying "Prince writes a letter to Konah" we can say "He writes a letter to her."

A preposition is a word that shows the relationship between one thing and another.

a preposition, an article, and a noun:

beside the bed over the rainbow around the corner
